



## 7 SEPTEMBER 2011 NINETIETH ANNIVERSARY





The celebration in Dublin took the form of Open Days at Concilium with the offices, the Hostels and Frank Duff's House as the open venues and at Myra House, the cradle of the Legion, where the original format of the House was restored, historical display boards were erected and people could come in, view the exhibition, sit, chat and have a cup of tea.

One lady, aged 97, came along. As a girl of 14, she had gone on a Legion outing to Co. Wicklow, to Glendalough, one of those spots in Ireland where heaven and earth seem to meet. She had her seat in the bus but, as will happen, an extra person showed up and she had to yield up her seat for someone who was older. As a result, she had the privilege of sitting on Br. Duff's knee for the trip, a memory cherished in her heart over the span of 83 years.

Myra House was refurbished for the occasion. The ground floor was restored to what it was in 1921 when the Legion was born. The statue of the Sacred Heart, a gift of Frank Duff's to the house, was restored to its dominant position in the entrance foyer. Frank once gave a conducted tour of the House and I was honoured to be able to record it. So we have the text of his words. Members entering the House and leaving always knelt a moment in prayer. Perhaps we will restore this practice. Fr. McGregor, Concilium Spiritual Director, came in after Mass in St. Nicholas of Myra Church and renewed the consecration of the House to the Sacred Heart. The Planning Office would not allow the wall of the old passageway to be replastered as the House is to-day a protected building. So the long wall was draped and the drapes carried the faces of the more that 80 Envoys who spread the Legion over the world and the faces of the more than 80 legionaries who held the first anniversary reunion in September 1922.

The faces and figures were life-size and so startlingly clear that you felt you could almost talk to each one or at least that they were in close communion with us.

Frank Duff called them the "spirited nucleus".

And many people remarked "Weren't they all lovely girls".

Fr. Michael Toher, Frank Duff and Mrs Elizabeth Kirwan were identified seated in the middle.


# FOUNDER OF THE LEGION OF MARY

#### EARLY LIFE

Francis Michael Duff was born in Phibsboro, Dublin on 7th June 1889. He was the eldest of seven, two of whom died as children. He attended Belvedere and Blackrock Colleges and was a gifted student. However, due to his father's premature illness money was in short supply and a university education was no longer an option. Frank joined the Civil Service taking first place in the entrance examination. He was assigned to the Department of Finance, devised a system of calculus which was subsequently adopted by the Treasury in London. He was a keen cyclist, played tennis and enjoyed a good social life. He was invited by a colleague to join the St. Vincent de Paul Society (SVP) and in October 1913 joined at the age of 24. He was affected by the chasm he saw between the society he moved in and the poverty, hunger and squalor he witnessed. Many who lived in tenement squalor were forced to soup attend kitchens sustenance, and some of the natural consequences of abject poverty, alcoholism and prostitution were rife in Dublin.

Accustomed to reading copiously he started reading more spiritual and theological books about God and the saints. Besides the physical needs of the people he encountered, Frank saw that many neglected the practice of the faith and needed encouragement.


1914, in parallel to his work with the St Vincent de Paul Society, Frank commenced his own personal apostolate visiting tenement houses where he received a kindly welcome. Proselytism was rife in Dublin at the time. SVP member, Joe Gabbett and some women had set up an alternative food centre for those in need. Frank involved himself in this work. Frank joined the Pioneer Total Abstinence Association of the Sacred Heart. In 1915 he joined the Third Order of the Carmelites and made the first of 49 pilgrimages to St. Patrick's Island, Lough Derg.

In 1916, he wrote a booklet "Can We Be Saints", his thesis being "in the heart of every right thinking Catholic, God has implanted the desire to become a saint." In 1917 he found a second-hand copy of "True Devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary" by St. Louis - Marie Grignion de Montfort. He had difficulty in coming to terms with the contents.

Joe Gabbett's formidable appearance belies his gentle heart. Gabbett, a former British Army Sergeant-Major, and Frank's early co-worker.




In 1919 he went to Mount Melleray Cistercian Abbey and read a book entitled "The Knowledge of Mary" by Fr. Januarius deConcilio, that opened up a new world for him.

It gave him a theological knowledge of Our Lady which was assumed in St. Louis de Monfort's book.

On 7 September 1921, fifteen women, Fr. Michael Toher CC, St. Nicholas of Myra parish and Frank Duff met in Myra House, 100 Francis Street, Dublin, to discuss how they might better serve the poor. The Legion of Mary was born.




The first work of the Legion of Mary was the visitation of the South Union Hospital (now incorporated as part of St James's Hospital), Dublin, to a section of the hospital frequented by few, if any, visitors to patients suffering from cancer.



Father Creedon had visited a well-known Dublin house of prostitution and had appealed to its 31 women to abandon their way of life and return to the practice of their religion.


He approached Frank Duff and the early legionaries. This gave rise to the retreat in the Sisters of Charity in Baldoyle, which 23 women attended.

Father Philip, the Franciscan priest who conducted the Retreat, was marvelous. The girls listened with rapt attention to his talks. Faith triumphed, the sort of faith that can move mountains.



Thanks to the good offices of the then Minister for Local Government, W. T. Cosgrave, a premises was procured in Harcourt Street Dublin, into which the girls moved at the end of the retreat which became known then as Sancta Maria Hostel.

There was at the time in Dublin an area of ill-repute known worldwide as Monto, a no-go area for law and order. In large run-down tenement houses resided many girls who plied the trade of prostitution. Legionaries decided to make a visit to this area and despite initial fears were made welcome by those living there. This was the Apostolate to Bentley Place. See Frank Duff's book 'Miracles on Tap'.

#### LATER LIFE

Frank Duff served in several Government departments until 1932 when he retired from the Civil Service to give his complete attention to the Legion of Mary, which, after the International Eucharistic Congress in Dublin, was expanding worldwide.



In 1965, Pope Paul VI invited Frank Duff to attend the Second Vatican Council as a Lay Observer, an honour by which the Pope recognised and affirmed Frank Duff's work for the lay apostolate.

He took to heart the words of Our Lord to Saint Margaret Mary Alacoque:

"My Heart is so inflamed with Love for men that it is no longer able to keep within itself the flames of its burning Love. It must make itself known unto men in order to enrich them with the treasures it contains".

#### CAUSE FOR CANONISATION

In July 1996 the Cause of Duff's Canonisation was introduced by the Archbishop of Dublin, Cardinal Desmond Connell. Wednesday January 14, 1998: The Tribunal for the Cause for his beatification was inaugurated by Archbishop (Cardinal Connell) on behalf of the Archdiocese of Dublin in Nazareth Hall at the Legion of Mary headquarters. The salvation of souls dominates the life of every saint. Frank found it difficult to imagine how you could save your own soul

without seeking to save the souls of others. The desire to save souls defines also the reason why he founded the Legion of Mary. 'Frank Duff was great in the small things, and heroic in doing the commonplace, and his purpose in all things great and small was his immense desire to love God and to be an instrument with and through Mary and the Holy Spirit in the conversion of sinners and the salvation of souls.'

#### WORDS OF FRANK DUFF

I do not think St. Ignatius would be comfortable with either word in the phrase 'Ignatian Spirituality'. And as for 'Ignatian', well he would say that Christian teachers do not stand on their own. They take their places in the river of tradition and all they do is to try to live the Gospel. There is one way - the Way, the Truth and the Life.

'Dublin was paralysed by the hugh traffic jam resulting from Frank Duff's funeral. Allow him a small chuckle from the grave. At the age of 91, he spent his last summer on a cycling trip around Ireland. Frank had planned a short trip with some friends around the Hill of Howth for 8 and 9 November 1980. When he died, his bicycle was in the hall downstairs and his packed bag was on the carrier ready for the planned departure the following morning.'

## PARISH OF ST. NICHOLAS OF MYRA AND MYRA HOUSE

Francis Street follows the course of the ancient road named Slí Cualann linking north to south and crossing the Liffey at Ath Cliath, the "hurdleford".

St. Patrick would have passed that way when he came to these parts and baptised his first converts at the well ever since called after him, St. Patrick's Well close by where St. Patrick's Cathedral stands to-day.


In 1235/6, just 9 years after the death of St. Francis, Ralph de Porter founded and built a house and chapel for the Franciscans on the east side of this road. Houses were built along the road and it became Francis Street. It was outside the city walls and in the Liberty of St. Thomas in which justice was dispensed by the Prior of the Augustinian monastery of St. Thomas.

The Franciscans of Francis Street were dispossessed under Henry VIII about 1534. The Friary was dismantled and its stonework sold for building material. The Franciscans never left Dublin however and by 1678 had reacquired the site for rebuilding when the Titus Oates plot brought fresh persecution. However, by 1709, a parish church had been erected on the site and Archdeacon Austin was appointed Parish Priest.

In 1709, Archbishop Edmond Byrne took up residence in Francis Street and the church served as a pro-Cathedral for him and eight Archbishops after him. The present church, begun in 1829 was completed in 1834 under Archdeacon Flanagan.

By coincidence, the Parish Priest at the time of the founding of the Legion of Mary was a namesake, Fr. (later Canon) Flanagan, who gave his blessing and support to the fledgling society. He was succeeded by Rev. Patrick (later Canon) Hayden in October 1923.

The curates who played a vital role in the establishment and development of the Legion were Fr. Michael Toher and Fr. Michael Creedon.



## MYRA HOUSE An Early History

In 1798, Anthony Metcalf, chandler and tobacconist, occupies a house in Francis Street then known as No. 46. (Thoms Directory.)

In 1834/5, Anthony Metcalf, soapboiler and chandler, occupies a house then numbered 106 but later re-numbered as No. 100, the present Myra House.

In 1844, No. 106 is still occupied by Anthony Metcalf, tallow chandler and No. 100 by Matthew Kehoe.

In 1854, No. 100 was listed as occupied by Matthew Kehoe (Keogh) provisions dealer while No's. 103 and 104 are occupied by Patrick Keogh.

In 1887, a book entitled "The Industries of Dublin" published by Spencer Blackett of London lauds the firm of Mathew Kehoe & Son, Ham and Bacon Curers, Lard Refiners and Export Merchants, of 100 Francis Street, said to be in business over 60 years. The building with its white granite frontage is described as an architectural ornament to the district.

By 1900, the firm's name has changed to Kehoe Donnelly & Packenham Ltd.

By 1911, the main workfloor has been adapted for use as a children's play centre by the Iveagh Trust, the philanthropic arm of Guinness' Brewery. Here King Edward V and Queen Mary on their coronation visit to Ireland are entertained by the children of the Liberties.

By 1915, No. 100 is described in Thoms Directory as being "in tenements" while at No. 103 Patrick Kehoe Ltd, Provision Merchants, continue to operate.

In 1916, on November 18th, Margaret M. Keogh, widow, by deed makes a gift of No. 100 Francis Street to Frank Sweeney, Barrister, as President of the St. Vincent dePaul Conference of St. Nicholas of Myra for the residue of a lease of 500 years from 25th March 1844.

# THE COMING OF THE LEGION

In 1916, No. 100 Francis Street is christened "Myra House" and the former factory floor (and recent play-centre) becomes the "Myra Hall". Frank Sweeney appoints Frank Duff - member of St Vincent dePaul - as liaison with the ladies group who provided free breakfasts on Sunday mornings to poor children, a service begun in conjunction with the Iveagh Play Centre since transferred to Bull Alley. In a survey carried out on Easter Monday 1917, it is found that only a few of the children came from poor families and, after discussion, this service was terminated. The ladies helped with other activities – the Penny Bank, catechism sessions for children after Sunday Mass, the Penny Library.

On 2nd February 1917, the St. Vincent dePaul Conference of St. Patrick is established in the House with Frank Duff as President. On April 27th, the Pioneer Total Abstinence Association of the Sacred Heart is established under the patronage of St. Patrick to promote temperance on the south side of the City. The Pioneer Council, all male, is set up on 5th May to man the Pioneer Centre open weekly to applicants for membership. In November, Frank Duff inaugurates the "League of Daily Mass" in Myra House which in four years numbers over 1000 members.

On 7th October 1918 as further compensation to the ladies for the closure of the free Sunday breakfasts for children, a decision is taken to invite ladies on to the Pioneer Council. Frank Duff approaches Mrs. Elizabeth Kirwan who begins to attend the monthly meeting from 4th November 1918.

In 1921, on Sunday August 14th, in a room in Myra House known as the Boardroom, a meeting is held to discuss the teaching of St. Louis Marie de Montfort in regard to devotion to Our Lady.

On Sunday August 28th, at the regular monthly meeting of the Council now incorporating the Pioneer Council, members of the former ladies group and a group of men calling themselves the Guild of St. Camillus, Matt Murray reports on his visit to the women's cancer ward in the South Dublin Union Hospital.

#### Early history

Two of the women, Mary and Emily Dooley, ask to be allowed do this work. The answer they get from Fr. Toher and Frank Duff is "Why not? Can you count on support?"

On Wednesday August 31st, a meeting was held by Fr. Toher and Frank Duff with six of the ladies to discuss the proposal and arrangements were made to begin.

On Wednesday September 7th, Frank Duff and 15 women inaugurate the first branch of the Legion of Mary under the title "Our Lady of Mercy". The preliminary and inaugural meetings were held in a back room whose location is marked for visitors in the courtyard of Tandy Court at the rere of Myra House. Elizabeth Kirwan of Dean Swift Square is chosen as first President.





The Pioneer Total Abstinence Association of the Sacred Heart was founded by Fr. James Cullen S.J. in the Church of Saint Francis Xavier, Gardiner Street, Dublin, on 28 December 1898. Fr Cullen was born in New Ross, Co Wexford, in 1841 and entered the Society of Jesus (the Jesuits) in 1901.

Fr. Cullen was always concerned with social issues, and his motivation in setting up the Pioneers was to address the enormous damage that he saw excess alcohol was doing in the Ireland of his times. Alcohol was the greatest drain on the weekly earnings of the family.

He had four co-founders: all of them were women, Mrs. A. Egan, Mrs. M.L. Bury, Mrs. A.M. Sullivan, and Miss L. Power, as Fr. Cullen's early vision was of an all-female organisation which, through its prayers and sacrifice in pledging to abstain from alcohol for life. After a very short time, Fr. Cullen extended the membership to all.

From the beginning, members - who joined in their thousands - pledged three things: to abstain from alcohol for life (which Fr. Cullen referred to as "The heroic sacrifice"); to say the Pioneer prayer twice a day; and to bear witness by wearing the pioneer pin at all times. The PTAA has always been underpinned by devotion to the Sacred Heart, and its emblem reflects this.

Fr. Cullen was a tireless and good organiser. He put his considerable energies into building up the association which he founded. In 1905, after five years, there were 43,000 members. In 1906 there were 70,000, and by 1910 there were 100,000. In the 1950s, as many as one in three Irish adults were members. And even though membership has declined considerably since then, there are still more than 100,000 Pioneers in Ireland today.

The Pioneers have played a very important role in Irish society in the 20th century. The historian Ulick O'Connor claims that the two organisations that contributed most to the building of modern Ireland were the Pioneers and the GAA. Some influential members include:

Venerable Matt Talbot: (1856 - 1925), Venerable Edel Quinn (1907 – 1943), Servant of God Frank Duff (1889 – 1980). Many Pioneers were subsequently to become members of the legion of Mary as well as the PTAA.

## MYRA HOUSE A MORE RECENT HISTORY

In 1931, the Guide to Catholic Dublin (Trinity Press) says that in Myra Hall "some 2000 children of the poor of the parish are entertained at Christmas and there too is annually held the Myra Feis which develops each year in greater importance to the social, educational and Irish-speaking aspects of Dublin life". Several of Dublin's stage personalities developed their talent in the Myra Hall, among others Noel Purcell, once caught in the act of stealing a slice of Mrs. Murray's plum pudding while the Christmas Pantomime was in progress, and Jack Cruise, who later nominated Frank Duff for the prestigious "Golden Heart" award of the Variety Clubs International.

At this time, the Legion of Mary, still lacking a mandate from the Diocese, leaves Myra House and receives shelter from James Larkin who helps with accommodation in Union premises in Thomas Street and later in Liberty Hall.

In 1965, the Legion returns, purchasing Myra House from the St. Vincent de Paul Society who had built themselves a place on Nicholas Street. Repairs are carried out in preparation for an All-Ireland Whitsun Congress attended by Frank Duff.

In 1971, Dr. McQuaid, Archbishop of Dublin has a plaque erected on the building to mark the 50th Anniversary of the founding of the Legion.

In 1981, ANCO carry out a programme of renovations to the front building, Myra House.

In 1998, the Myra Hall is considered unsafe and is sold as part of the Tandy Court development. However the site of the backroom in which the Legion was founded is outlined in brick and marked with notices by order of Dublin Corporation.

In 2011, Myra House, thanks to Architect Georgina Hutton, puts on its best garb to welcome guests who wish to share in the joy of the Legion's 90th Anniversary.


# **CONCILIUM EXHIBITION**





The Concilium office which is situated between the Regina Coeli and Morning Star Hostels, on Morning Star Avenue, Brunswick Street, had an Open Day on Wednesday 7 September for the 90th anniversary. The large room at the front of the building, where many meetings are held, had a display of souvenirs which had been donated to the Concilium, and other items of interest. Images of Our Lady from various countries, such as Our Lady of Guadalupe from Mexico, Nossa Senhora Aparecida from Brazil and Our Lady with the Child Jesus in traditional Korean dress, were among these. A large selection of Legion Handbooks in a variety of languages was also on display. The centrepiece of this room was Our Lady's Altar with the Statue used at the first Legion meeting in 1921.

The large hall, known as Nazareth Hall, where the monthly meeting of the Concilium, the central council for the world is held, was used for the main exhibition, which was quite extensive. Large display boards were used for photographs and text showing some aspects of Legion history.

A very valuable part of the exhibition was a number of stands on loan from Blackrock College (C.S.Sp.) showing photographs of the Servant of God Frank Duff as a student at the College and also in later years at special events in the College with some other alumni of the College who became prominent in ecclesiastical and political life. There was a display of photographs of Legion Envoys and there was also information on the Legion Hostels.

Visitors, to the number of about 300, who came from various parts of the country, such as Antrim, Cork, Donegal, Wexford, etc. as well as Dublin, and some from as far as Mexico, had the opportunity also to view Frank Duff's house, a short walk from the Concilium office. There they could see the various rooms, where Frank's mother and some of the family as well as Frank himself lived. Various items, including the bicycle on which Frank travelled many of the roads of Ireland, were on display in one of the rooms. The most significant room now is the bedroom where Frank died on 7 November 1980. Some of the visitors were able to avail also of a shuttle bus to visit Frank's grave in Glasnevin Cemetery.



# The Legionary World

The Legion of Mary an apostolic organisation of lay people in the Catholic Church, has well over 3 million active members in almost every country in the world.

Works include, door to door evangelisation, parishioner visitation, prison ministry, visitation of the sick or aged, crowd contact, religious education, visiting the newly baptised and daily recitation of the Rosary.
Legionaries are under the guidance of a Spiritual Director, named by the Parish Priest. The Legion is, in essence, an extension of the heart and hands of the Parish Priest.

Countries are arranged in Zones for reporting purposes, some have additional territories which are too small in size to indicate accurately on the map above. Reports are presented to the Ruling Council of the World, the Concilium Legionis Mariae. Communication is maintained monthly by many means but specifically through a system of Correspondents.

Fr. Moynagh and Ekeng worked hard to build up and extend the Legion. Bishop McGetterick, of Ogoja, wrote about Ekeng: "Michael Ekeng's capacity for work is amazing. I have known him to start from Calabar at 1:00 a. m. travel by canoe to Oron, a distance of eighteen miles, go from there to a Legion meeting fifty-five miles away, and, after the meeting, cycle another twelve miles to the nearest mission receive Holy Communion. He fasted during the whole journey."

In Korea, almost 7% of the Catholic population are members of the Legion of Mary.



## **Legion Aim**

The object of the Legion of Mary is the glory of God through the holiness of its members developed by prayer and active co-operation in Mary's and the Church's work.

### **Legion Unit**

The unit of the Legion of Mary is called a praesidium, which holds a weekly meeting, where prayer is intermingled with reports and discussion. Persons who wish to join the Legion must apply for membership in a Praesidium.

The Holy Spirit has made Mary His spouse and helpmate in this Renewal, and likewise her devoted children.

Frank Duff lived to see the legion become, as prophesised by St. Louis Marie de Montfort, "that mighty legion of brave and valiant soldiers of Jesus and Mary, of both sexes, to fight the devil, the world, and corrupt nature in those more than ever perilous times that are to come."

### Works of the Legion

The Legion sees as its priority the spiritual and social welfare of each individual. The members participate in the life of the parish through visitation of families, the sick, both in their homes and in hospitals and through collaboration in every apostolic and missionary undertaking by the parish. Every legionary is required to carry out a weekly apostolic work in the spirit of faith and in union with Mary.

### **Auxiliary Membership**

This membership is open to Priests, Religious and lay people who wish to associate themselves with the Legion by undertaking a service of prayer in its name.


